

2020 Financial Update

Many of you have been asking how SLCC fared during the past year of the pandemic. Understandably, virtually all of our family reunions for the past summer cancelled or postponed their events. An abbreviated summer schedule saw only a 13% decline in our camper attendance. Many of our fall and winter groups have returned albeit generally a bit smaller than in the past. All of that said, Swan Lake's financial picture looks really good. We ended the year in the black by almost \$6,000. We did receive about \$39,000 of government aid. Expenditures were lower and donations remained steady. We began the bathhouse project with materials purchased before March and we did as much with volunteers as possible. I appreciate each of the staff members who made due with what was on hand and I feel blessed to see how God has sustained this camp. I know that others have been deeply affected by this past year and I pray that they also have felt the hand of God holding and keeping them through all of it. I want to thank all of you for your prayers and for your support.

Judi and I spent much of this fall with her father, Erland Thieszen. We were both with him in the doctor's office when the neurosurgeon gave him the long face. The problem with his left hand was a brain tumor in an inoperable location. Again, we were both with him when members of his congregation gathered around him to pray for a miraculous recovery. I saw his faith and the faith of many people who were close to him.

Since Judi left in 1988 to spend the summer counseling at Swan Lake Christian Camp, she never lived at home again with her father. Erland and I formed a friendship in 1992 when I met him as the summer staff were in Henderson for the fourth of July. As Judi and my relationship grew, Erland and I also grew to know each other better although we never lived within 200 miles. Erland was my wife's dad.

Erland lost his wife Glenda in 1986 to cancer. In 1994, he married again and lost Ruth Ann also to cancer a dozen years later. Through all of this, he trusted God. Now, during his own battle with cancer, he again showed his faith in God. He believed that he would receive a miracle. Almost daily, I could see signs of deterioration. He lost his ability to grip. Then he lost all use of his hand. His left leg soon followed. Before long, we were calling hospice for assistance with his daily care.

The miracle that I received was getting to truly know Erland. I met neighbors whom he had prayed for. Neighbors brought food and sat with him. There were tears and much laughter. Erland shared about his first date with Glenda. Judi and I, her brother Micah and her sister Rachel were with him when he passed away in his living room on Judi's birthday. The picture above was taken just one week earlier. Erland prayed for a miracle, then he prayed to go home. Even when he did not understand, he trusted that God did. We miss him, but we celebrate a faith worth emulating.


Bathhouse Project

The Swan Lake Christian Camp board of directors approved the building of a new bathhouse connected to the west of the chapel. The old bathhouse was built near the end of the gang shower era. Although partitions had been added, privacy was minimal and space was really tight. This building will be repurposed as a new cabin with a bathroom facilities included.

The new bathhouse will include a floor plan that allows it to be used for both genders if needed. It will also provide the supervision that seems prudent with proper privacy including enclosed changing areas for each shower. The building is accessible both from the outside as well as through the chapel with an eye towards a future renovation of the chapel space.

Most of the sheetrock is hung. Some building materials are being delayed because of work stoppages. Our intention is to have this building functional for the summer. For that to happen, I will be asking for some volunteers to step forward. After the mudding and taping, we will need to put up tile, paint and hang toilet partitions.

I would also ask for your financial help with this project. Building materials are much higher than anticipated. We need about \$25,000 to complete this project.
