Do you have a favorite character from the biblical Christmas Story? I remember as a kid my parents would read the Christmas story, and we would place each nativity piece one at a time into the stable at the right time. Baby Jesus and Mary were always favorites. Or sometimes the shepherd with the cute little sheep. But for me, it definitely wasn't the Kings. They were so ostentatious (or ugly in my childish mind), dressed in flashy robes carrying fancy boxes. They didn't seem to fit in the "barn" with the donkey and sheep. Interesting how I thought Baby Jesus fit in a manger just fine.

Now today, I know that our Westernized nativity scene isn't exactly how it happened those many years ago in the little town of Bethlehem. The stable really wasn't a barn, but more likely a dark cave. And the manger probably wasn't a cute little cradle made of wood, but a hollow in the rock. And the Kings didn't show up with the Shepherds that night, but probably instead a year or more later at the home of Mary, Joseph and Jesus. But the nativity scene itself has made an impact in many of our lives. It helps us to connect with the characters, to picture what it was really like for them. For us in the Midwest, we wonder what it would be like to have a baby in a barn without any help. How would we respond if we were in each their shoes?

I would love to tell you that I would respond like Mary, easily surrendering my life to God's plan. Praying the prayer of relinquishment, "I am the Lord's servant. May your word to me be fulfilled." (Luke 1:38) But instead, I often find myself holding tightly to the control of my life, as if I have the power to control my circumstances. I don't identify with Joseph either, obeying God's commands despite the criticism and shame he would experience from his family and community. So many times in my life I have gone along with the crowd, doing what is acceptable to them even if it wasn't right.

Instead, I find myself most closely in the Kings, Wise Men or Magi. Now there is some mystery around these men. Who were they, really? And where did they come from? But what I find most interesting is that they were from the outside, probably Persia. The Bible tells us that they followed the star to find Jesus, who they knew to be King of the Jews, and they worshipped Him. (Matthew 2:1-12) But why would they do this? And how did they know He was the King of the Jews? The term Magi in the Greek suggests they were magicians, astrologers, or priests from a different religion. The Message translation of the Bible calls them scholars. Whatever they were, we know they studied and believed enough to travel away from their homeland to search for Jesus. I wonder if we had depicted the Magi in the nativity scene as college graduates or rocket scientists if I would have been more attracted to them as a child. As an adult, I am fascinated by them and why they even made it into the Christmas Story. They remind me that even when I feel like I'm on the outside, to search for Jesus. Even when the road is difficult or when it doesn't make sense, keep following the light that leads to The King. They encourage me to study to know the signs of Jesus, to know The King. They show me that it is worth great hardship to be able to worship at the feet of Jesus. I think God knew we would need these reminders, this outside perspective of the birth of our Savior.

I pray that today you too would be encouraged by these men. I pray that you would follow their example and search for Jesus, the King, and worship at His feet.

We have currently hosted and rescheduled seven three day weekend groups specifically geared towards growing the faith of adults. This is a relatively new emphasis for Swan Lake Christian Camp and one that I am particularly excited about.

It is also very exciting to recognize that the current chapel is no longer large enough for our youth camps. I believe that people are drawn to camp because of the clear gospel message that is being delivered. Pray that that continues. Our intent is to build space that invites people to experience Christ without distractions. I am sure that we will discuss more of these plans at the upcoming annual meeting the second Sunday in March.

Again, I just want to ask you to continue praying for the camp. I had another person saying that as they simply looked at our website, they felt the presence of the Holy Spirit. I have had too many others say similar things about just turning on to the driveway not to believe that this is because this place is slathered in abundant prayer.
