I see God working and I see myself not quite in lock step with him. I have been reading quite a lot lately and II Chronicles 33 really jumped out at me, specifically verses 10-13. Our God is a God of immeasurable mercy. The vat from which he dispenses grace is unfathomably huge. He slathers us with comfort and I am the fool who thinks that if I just dip my big toe in the shallow end, that I will be satisfied.

I know that the devotional was sent by divine messenger. I called the sender and he acknowledged that he had not intended it for me. Like my friend, I want to always look for God in my daily experiences. I feel that I do this best when I am reading consistently. My hope is that this space will be used for the next sixty years like the current dining hall which was built in 1967. We want many people to experience the love of God that we felt when we first came to camp.
